

<u>PATIENT INFORMATION LEAFLET:</u> The contraceptive injection – Depo-provera or Noristerat

The contraceptive injection is over 99% effective (less than 1 in 100 women using the injection would get pregnant in a year)

The injection contains a progesterone hormone. It is injected by a doctor or nurse into a muscle - usually in your bottom, or sometimes into your arm or leg.

The Depo-Provera injection is given every 12 weeks. An alternative (Noristerat) is given every 8 weeks

WHAT ARE THE PROS & CONS?

WHEN CAN THE INJECTION BE GIVEN?

- The contraceptive injection can be given at ANY point in your menstrual cycle providing you are certain you are not pregnant. A pregnancy test can be relied upon if it is negative 3 weeks after unprotected intercourse
- If the injection is given during the first 5 days of your period it is effective immediately; if given on any other day of your cycle then you would need to use another mode of contraception (e.g. condoms) for the first 7 days after the injection is given
- After childbirth the injection can be given as soon as 3 weeks after childbirth

HOW TO PROCEED:
